LEGAL OPINION ON THE BINGA-AMBUKLAO DAM CASE INVOLVING THE CLAIM OF ICCs OF ROYALTIES AND THE CONDUCT OF THE FPIC PROCESS

PRELIMINARY STATEMENT

This is a legal opinion drafted by the Interns of the CJ Moran Community Legal Assistance Office, who are duly certified by the Office of the Court Administrator of the Supreme Court as Level 2 Law Student Practitioners, and the Executive Judge of the Baguio City Regional Trial Court as Level 1 Law Student Practitioners.

This legal opinion is drafted pursuant to the request and the Memorandum of Agreement between Saint Louis University School of Law and the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples in the Cordillera Administrative Region, to undertake exploratory and merit-based research to formulate the necessary recommendation regarding this issue.

The set of facts used to justify legal conclusions are based from the documents received by the Office from the NCIP.

ESTABLISHED FACTS

HISTORY

Indigenous Cultural Communities/Indigenous Peoples (ICCs/IPs) who were affected by the construction of the Ambuklao and Binga Hydroelectric Power Plants (HEPPs) are generally the Ibaloy ethnolinguistic group of the Province of Benguet. Reports disclosed that the construction of the HEPP "displaced" a number of families, submerged substantial productive rice lands and other agricultural lands (some of which are titled), and affected the livelihood/life ways of the concerned ICCs/IPs.
