Three to five years after graduation, graduates of the BS Psychology Program are expected to:

- a. apply professional knowledge and skills in evidence-based psychological practice under the supervision of a licensed Psychology Professional as necessary in educational, clinical and industrial-organizational settings;
- b. practice Christian Spirit values, empathic understanding, and compassionate caring while being guided by professional ethics in the delivery of psychological services in educational, clinical, and industrial-organizational settings;
- c. participate in pursuing creative, novel ideas by utilizing decision-making and critical thinking skills using a variety of resources and digital tools in the Psychology practice; and
- d. demonstrate responsive skills and social responsibility while providing or assisting in psychological assessment and interventions, or implementing mental health programs with due regard for the dignity and inherent worth of all human beings.



PROGRAM LEARNING OBJECTIVES (PLOs)

At the end of the program, the would-be Psychologists are expected to:

1. engage in lifelong learning to keep abreast of the developments and trends in the practice of psychology;
2. integrate scientific reasoning to interpret psychological phenomena;
3. examine arguments about established principles in psychology by evaluating and interpreting evidence-based studies from a variety of perspectives;
4. evaluate biological, psychological, and social foundations of typical and atypical behavior and mental processes;
5. demonstrate critical thinking to evaluate theories, principles, concepts, and skills in psychology;
6. demonstrate effective communication skills, orally and in writing in English and Filipino, to convey research findings, psychological concerns, and issues;
7. use appropriate research methods in the design, data analysis, and interpretation of psychological research that will contribute to knowledge- building;
8. appraise the established principles in psychology through an understanding of sociocultural diversity and societal inequality in the inquiry and analysis of psychological issues
9. apply psychological theories, principles, concepts, and skills in the context of psychological assessment, psychological programs, and psychological interventions as a way of addressing the clients' issues, both personal and social;
10. exhibit social understanding and interpersonal competence essential for the appropriate and ethical delivery of psychological service;
11. apply professional, social, and ethical responsibility in the use of psychological theories and methods;
12. apply principles in Psychology in one's personal development and professional practice by integrating the knowledge gained about Filipino cultural heritage.
13. demonstrate adequate self-awareness that allows for an accurate and objective psychological evaluation to work effectively and independently in multidisciplinary and multicultural teams;
14. practice one's capability for self-reflection and independent learning in graduate education in Psychology and/or in the professional practice of Psychology; and
15. practice Christian values in their personal and professional endeavors as Louisians in the service of the CICM mission.

ADMISSION POLICIES

Saint Louis University accepts local and foreign students in accordance with the SLU Admission policy.

Undergraduate Students:

- Students who graduated from Senior High School Tracks HUMSS, ABM, and STEM are welcome to apply for admission to the program.
- All undergraduate freshman applicants must pass the SLU College Entrance Examination (SLU-CEE) and must qualify within the slots duly determined for BS Psychology. The regular SLU-CEE is conducted during weekends from the middle of October up to the middle of December. Admission for the first semester starts in the middle of April.

Undergraduate Transferees:

- SLU admits transferees in BS Psychology subject to their compliance with pertinent requirements and guidelines. They must undergo a Qualifying Examination (QE) and if qualified, will take the Personality Test and Interview. Foreign students applying as transferees are subject to the English Proficiency Test (EPT) rule.
- Because BS Psychology is a board program, only transferees who are in their first and second-year levels in their previous universities or colleges are welcome to apply. Any subjects considered as board courses for licensure examination in psychometrics and psychology must be retaken in SLU. Transcript of Records are carefully evaluated to match the SLU BS Psychology Course Description, Course Content, and Units.
- Students who intend to transfer to SLU BS Psychology and who are already in their third and fourth-year levels are not accepted.

Undergraduate Shifters:

- Applicants who intend to shift to SLU BS Psychology shall undergo a strict evaluation of their previous academic performances. At least a General Weighted Average Grade of 80% and above from the total number of units of their previously enrolled courses are required. Crediting of courses previously enrolled in is subject to evaluation. Psychology major courses are only allowed when prerequisite psychology major courses have already been accomplished and passed by the student applicant:

Foreign Student:

- Foreign students should apply not later than six months before the start of the academic term. Moreover, they should be in Baguio City at least four weeks before the start of classes of the academic term for them to take the EPT as well as SLU-CEE / QE / GPPE, and Personality Test. Foreign students applying for the first time, either in the undergraduate or graduate program, should initially possess satisfactory proficiency in English and have passed the EPT as well as the pertinent entrance examination and Personality Test. Before enrolling, they undergo Preadmission Processing at the Student Affairs Office.
- Foreign students must secure a valid Student Visa. There are two options for securing a Student Visa. For related information, consult the Foreign Student section of the Registrar's Office. Saint Louis University welcomes local and foreign students alike, subject to University Admission Policies, requirements, and academic standards, and pertinent laws of the Republic of the Philippines.

Graduate Students:

- The applicant must have finished the prerequisite degree/s, ideally BS Psychology prior to acceptance to the MS Psychology Graduate Program;
- For a Master's degree, the applicant must have a Baccalaureate degree from an institution of recognized standing.
- For a Doctorate degree, the applicant must have a Master's degree in related fields from an institution of recognized standing.
- Applicants who have not finished the prerequisite degree but intend to pursue MS Psychology or Ph.D. in Psychology are required to take bridging courses upon evaluation of the transcript of records and advise of the Graduate Program Coordinator.

CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

After completing and passing all the required courses of the BS Psychology Program, graduates are expected to take the licensure examination for psychometricians.

Job opportunities for graduates of BS Psychology is diverse. They could be licensed psychometricians (RPM) who can work in the academe, industrial and clinical settings. In school/academe settings, they can be employed as teachers or professors teaching psychology, behavioral and social science related courses; they can be school psychometricians and school guidance advocates, research assistants, school guidance counselors, Human Resource assistants in the school HR Offices, school mental health advocates.

In the industry setting, they can be Human Resource practitioners, industry mental health advocates, company psychometrician, company managers.

In the clinical setting, they can be assistants to licensed psychologists (RPsy)/counselors (RGC, community mental health advocates.

They can also pursue further studies in medicine, law, management, and other human service-related programs, allied health services, etc.

With further specialized training, graduates of BS Psychology may pursue specializations in Psychology, such as clinical, counseling, developmental, educational, social, industrial/organizational, etc.
