SLU OGRAA Hosts TES Orientation for Scholar Grantees

Saint Louis University (SLU) upholds a clear institutional commitment to ensuring that students from financially disadvantaged households successfully complete their academic programs. While the University does not set a numerical target, it maintains a completion-oriented objective for all recipients of poverty-linked financial aid, including grantees of the Tertiary Education Subsidy (TES) under UniFAST. This institutional direction is reflected in SLU's systematic support mechanisms that help low-income scholars progress toward graduation.

A key initiative demonstrating this commitment is the University's public orientation for TES scholars conducted through the Office of Global Relations and Alumni Affairs (OGRAA). The orientation held on 27 February 2025 provided comprehensive guidance on scholarship policies, responsibilities, retention requirements, and grounds for termination, ensuring that financially disadvantaged students clearly understand the conditions necessary to remain eligible until program completion. Representatives from UniFAST also addressed student questions through an open forum, reinforcing transparency and helping scholars avoid risks that could interrupt their academic continuity.

By offering structured guidance, direct coordination with UniFAST, and continuous support to TES grantees, SLU operationalizes its target of enabling low-income students to meet academic requirements and complete their degrees. These practices publicly affirm the University's mission to support educational attainment among financially vulnerable students and to uphold inclusive access to quality higher education for those with limited household income.



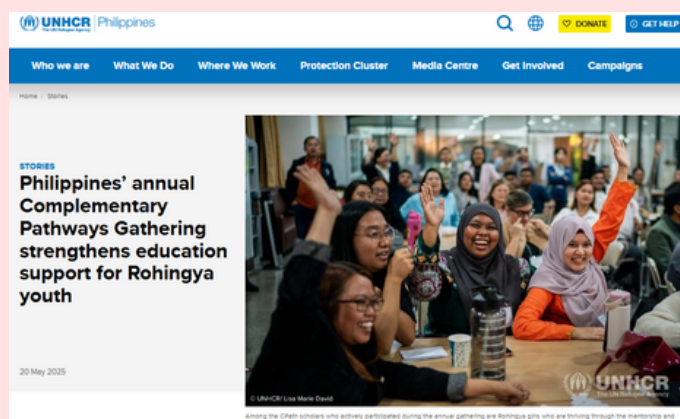
SLU Affirms Its Commitment to Support Rohingya Refugee-Scholars

The United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) – Philippines and the Philippine Government, through the Department of Justice – Refugees and Stateless Persons Protection Unit (DOJ-RSPPU), conducted the 2nd National Complementary Pathways (CPath) Gathering of Rohingya refugee-scholars at the American Corner Baguio, 4th Floor, Msgr. Charles Vath Building, Saint Louis University (SLU), Baguio City. The event brought together Rohingya students enrolled in various universities across the country, including SLU, to strengthen partnerships that foster inclusive and holistic educational environments beyond borders.

Rooted in the institution's core value of Compassion, the initiative embodies the University's mission to serve with love that acts. Moreover, the said activity directly supports Sustainable Development Goal 1 by providing access to financial assistance, protection, and educational opportunities for displaced and economically disadvantaged refugee-scholars. Through the CPath program, these learners are empowered to pursue higher education despite legal and financial barriers, helping to reduce poverty and promote equitable access to quality learning for marginalized populations in the Philippines.
