Last 5 April 2025, SLU Marketing Mixers (MM), together with the Community Extensions and Outreach Program Office (CEOPO), officially launched its Mission Chikiting: officially launched its Mission Uplifting the Next Generation – – a onemonth community outreach program children's to empower development in the city by supporting their ensuring and long-term sustainability through hands-on community care that maintains involvement, builds lasting connections, and provides beneficial initiatives.

Weekly visitations for a month will be conducted in order to ensure continuous support among the children. During the first visit, 15 sets of school supplies were donated to them to support their academic needs. More necessities, along with programs and activities will be provided for them over the next three weeks the nurture their well-being. The organization aims to reach different communities in Baguio every semester. For this term, the beneficiaries are children residing beside the Baguio Dumpsite at Barangay Dontogan, Baguio City.

This initiative accomplishes Sustainable Development Goal 3 (Good Health and Well-being) by improving children's overall well-being by means of community involvement and support. In addition, it also helps achieve Sustainable Development Goal 10 (Reduced Inequalities) by giving underprivileged kids equal opportunities, thus bridging the gap for education, care and assistance.

The program is in partnership with The Compassion Company, a non-profit organization that serves the least, the lost, and the left out within Baguio City and beyond.

WORKSHOPS TO SUPPORT LEARNERS WITH SPECIAL NEEDS AND A PARENTING WORKSHOP ON NONVERBAL COMMUNICATION







The Saint Louis University (SLU) Sunflower Child and Youth Wellness Center (SCYWC) strengthen continues to partnerships to provide quality services for children with special needs and their families in Baguio City and surrounding communities.

On 12 July 2025, members the Communities Aligning Baguio and Antonio, Texas (CĂBSĂT) collaborated with Sunflower Pedagogical the Developmental Center (SPDC) to hold a "Equipping one-day seminar titled Educators: Best Practices for Supporting Students with Special Needs." The event, held at the SIRIB Center on SLU's Main brought together 60 Campus, teachers. parents, caregivers, community advocates with professionals from San Antonio, Texas. Led by special education expert Almie Pachoco-Latimore, the Southwest SpEd. from Independent School District, the seminar offered practical strategies for teaching math, reading, writing, and storytelling, equipping participants with tools they could immediately use in classrooms and homes.

A particularly moving part of the event came when parents of children with special needs shared personal stories, offering an intimate view of the challenges and triumphs of raising children with unique abilities. One mother's story about her son's journey toward self-sufficiency deeply resonated with participants, highlighting how love and persistence can transform lives. The seminar also featured virtual contributions from San Antonio educators and counselors, emphasizing individualized learning, multi-tiered systems of support, and assistive technology. This exchange of knowledge and empathy reflected the shared commitment to inclusion collaboration between Baguio and San Antonio. The activity supports the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals 4 (Quality Education) and 10 (Reduced Inequality).


RUN FOR HOPE 11: A HOPEFUL STRIDE FOR CHILDREN

From 26-28 March 2025, the cool mountains of Baguio City became the inspiring setting for the 2025 Scholars' Leadership Boot Camp (SLC)—a three-day training that gathered promising young leaders from across the Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR). Designed for second- and third-year scholars, the event aimed to develop leadership grounded in values, responsibility, and service. Participation required prior completion of the Values Formation Program and demonstrated leadership potential, ensuring a select group of passionate student leaders. Among them were thirteen scholars from Saint Louis University (SLU), many of whom were active members of the Baguio Association of Government Grantees and Scholars (BAGGS). Their involvement reflected both their personal commitment to growth and SLU's mission of forming servant-leaders dedicated to making a positive social impact.

The camp offered a rich blend of workshops, plenary sessions, and outdoor team-building activities focused on ethical leadership, social responsibility, effective communication, and community-based project development. Resource speakers inspired participants to embrace servant leadership—leading with empathy, humility, and purpose—while group discussions and collaborative challenges strengthened teamwork and solidarity among scholars from diverse provinces. As the camp concluded, participants returned home with renewed motivation, deeper insight, and stronger leadership skills. THE LAUNCH OF SEMEK, THE CORDILLERA HUMAN RIGHTS HUB

Saint Louis University (SLU), through its School of Law and the Chief Justice Manuel V. Moran Community Legal Assistance Office, in partnership with The Asia Foundation (TAF) and other institutions, officially launched the Human Rights Hub in the Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR) on June 9, 2025. Dubbed "Semek"an Ibaloi word meaning "love"—the hub aims to enhance human rights protection awareness through collaboration among civil, legal, and academic sectors. The launch brought together key partners, including the Integrated Bar of the Philippines, Commission on Human Rights-CAR, law schools across the region, and civil society organizations. A Memorandum of Understanding was signed between SLU President Rev. Fr. Gilbert B. Sales, CICM, PhD, and TAF Country Representative Sam Chittick, marking the start of a one-year partnership to support the initiative.

The event also highlighted Baguio City's role in advancing human rights through local legislation, notably the Human Rights Defenders Ordinance passed in December 2024. Speakers, including Councilor Jose Molintas, Levi Glen Ingente, and Abigail Bengwayan-Anongos, underscored the importance of amplifying the voices of civil society and human rights defenders. In her closing remarks, SLU School of Law Dean Atty. Yasmine Lee R. Tadeo emphasized the University's commitment to collaboration, education, and advocacy for the common good. The initiative strengthens SLU's alignment with CICM advocacies on peace and justice and supports the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals on reducing inequalities, promoting peace and justice, and building strong institutional partnerships.
