

The SLU Museum of Igorot Cultures and Arts actively champions the preservation and dissemination of Cordilleran heritage through a robust series of educational initiatives and hands-on workshops focused on traditional music and dance. The museum facilitated immersive learning experiences, including a specialized training session on the dinuy-ya gong dance for Baguio City's Sangguniang Kabataan and advanced workshops on the Balliwes and Lablabbaan dances. By extending its educational reach to include a curricular tour for University of the Philippines students studying the "History of Ethnic Minorities," SLU-MICA serves as a vital conduit for cultural transmission, ensuring that the intricate rhythms and movements of the region's indigenous identity are skillfully passed down to the next generation of leaders and scholars.

Held at Caryl's Haven Café 5-758 Palew, Caponga, the training aimed to assist the members of the Cacao Growers and Processors Tublay Association (CGaPTA) by enhancing their knowledge and discussing strategies for marketing their business and products.

Furthermore, to enhance disaster preparedness, Barangay Virac, Itogon, Benguet, in partnership with Saint Louis University (SLU), launched a Computer-Based Barangay Hazard Map Program, which was the replication of the SLU School of Engineering and Architecture's (SEA) extension program. The event gathered SLU faculty members, local officials, and community representatives to formalize their commitment to utilizing technology for hazard mapping.






SLU played an instrumental role in the development of Cordillera Heritage 101 (CORDI 101), a workbook created under the collaborative initiative Project Cordillera HERITAGE. This educational resource was designed to document, preserve, and transmit the intangible cultural heritage of the Cordilleran ethnic groups—capturing their distinct traditions, indigenous knowledge, languages, and socio-cultural practices. As documented Acknowledgement of Contribution section of the workbook (p. 333), SLU is listed among the key collaborating higher education institutions involved in shaping, refining, and finalizing the educational material. The page also notes that SLU, along with leaders, faculty members, and cultural experts from various HEIs across the region, participated in regional consultations and workshops that informed the content of the publication.

By participating in this project, SLU helped deepen understanding among students and communities of their cultural roots, encouraging immersive learning and social responsibility grounded in native traditions. CORDI 101 supports inclusive and equitable education while safeguarding local heritage, including the documentation of local folklore, traditions, indigenous knowledge, and the lived heritage of culturally distinct or displaced communities.

This initiative demonstrates SLU's active partnership in regional heritage work and its commitment to sustaining cultural identity through education, curriculum development, and community engagement.

Culture-Based Curriculum Development Component Spearheads Bloom's Books Pilot Testing and Validation

In the upland community of Sitio Manabayukan, literacy is not only taught, it is lived, spoken, and passed from one generation to the next. On October 17, 2025, a significant step toward inclusive and culturally grounded education took place as the Culture-Based Curriculum Development component of Project Aytalakad Ing Lahi successfully conducted the pilot testing and validation of Aeta Mag-Anchi Bloom's Books initiative. The activity brought together educators and community leaders in a shared and collective effort to ensure that the educational materials in their native language remain rooted in cultural authenticity while preserving the integrity of indigenous knowledge and narratives.

Saint Louis University (SLU), through its collaboration with Project Aytalakad Ing Lahi, played a central role in the preservation of intangible cultural heritage by spearheading the pilot testing and validation of the Aeta Mag-Anchi Bloom's Books in Sitio Manabayukan on 17 October 2025. The initiative forms part of the Culture-Based Curriculum Development component of the project, which aims to ensure that educational materials written in the Aeta Mag-Anchi language faithfully reflect the community's lived experiences, traditional knowledge, and cultural identity.

The activity brought together educators, cultural experts, SLU faculty members, community elders, and teachers of Sitio Manabayukan Elementary School in a shared mission to safeguard cultural authenticity. Through handson teaching demonstrations using texts such as Mitata Anak and Kanén in Stage 3, Aeta Mag-Anchi learners participated in reading and interacting with materials written in their own language. Guest experts and project leaders assessed reading comprehension, cultural resonance, linguistic accuracy, and curriculum alignment, ensuring that the books remain rooted in indigenous worldviews while meeting academic standards.

Community members, local teachers, and project collaborators validated the manuscripts and evaluated content using established quality checklists. The process identified areas for refinement while affirming the cultural integrity of the stories, vocabulary, and illustrations. More than a technical exercise, the validation became a moment of cultural affirmation—as Aeta Mag-Anchi students saw their language, stories, and identity represented and honored in print.

Through this culturally grounded approach, Project Aytalakad Ing Lahi, with SLU's participation, ensures that the next generation of Aeta Mag-Anchi learners engages with education that strengthens identity and preserves indigenous narratives. The initiative demonstrates a meaningful commitment to recording, protecting, and transmitting intangible cultural heritage, serving as a model for community-based curriculum development that uplifts marginalized and displaced indigenous communities.
