Smart Waste Solutions for a Sustainable Future: AIWAN-Based Framework for barangay waste management

In a joint effort to advance sustainable urban living, the Saint Louis University School of Engineering and Architecture – Industrial Engineering Department (SLU-SEA IE) has partnered with government and institutional stakeholders to pioneer a forward-looking initiative on waste management.

On 27 May 2025, the capstone project titled "Evaluating Barangay Waste Management and (Materials Recovery Facility) MRF Utilization in Baguio City: An Adoption of Intelligent Waste Actions through a Smart Network System (A.I.W.A.N)-Based Framework for Smart, Sustainable Waste Solutions" was formally presented at the Synergize Innovation and Gravitate Leadership towards Adaptive Technologies (SIGLAT)-Baguio Youth Innovation Hub, at the Baguio Convention and Cultural Center.

The initiative represents a concrete step toward Baguio's Smart City goals, integrating technology, data, and participatory governance into solid waste management systems. By examining waste generation patterns and evaluating barangay-level MRF performance, the students proposed practical solutions aimed at improving segregation, collection, and recycling. These efforts highlight how academic research can contribute to sustainable development in line with SDG 11 (Sustainable Cities and Communities), SDG 13 (Climate Action), and SDG 17 (Partnerships for the Goals).

Representatives from the University of the Philippines Baguio, the City Environment and Parks Management Office (CEPMO), the General Services Office (GSO), and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) attended the event, providing valuable feedback and validating the proposed framework. Their participation underscored the potential of the project to influence both local governance and policy-making.

Saint Louis University continues to demonstrate its commitment to environmental sustainability, community engagement, and innovative learning through its ongoing Hydroponics Initiative, a program that combines service learning with hands-on agricultural technology for the betterment of local communities.

Launched as part of the university's call-to-action advocacy aligned with the Binnadang community engagement and sustainable development goals through the collaboration of faculty and students from the Youth Council of Ecolodians (a Uni-wide organization on environmental sustainability) and Service Learning Program of the National Service Training Program (NSTP) of the University, the initiative has seen significant progress and meaningful milestones over the past few months, actively involving students, teaching, and non-teaching personnel in all phases, from planning and cultivation to social involvement and distribution.

The initiative is a collaboration between SLU, the City Veterinary and Agriculture Office (CVAO), and other local partners. It has made significant strides in combining education, research, and social responsibility over the past few months.

SLU's Hydroponics Initiative is more than just a farming project- it is a growing movement toward responsible innovation, environmental consciousness, and active citizenship. Such advocacies are in line with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 12 (Responsible Production and Consumption).

In the spirit of volunteerism and interprofessional collaboration, the Medical Outreach Missions Fellowship Initiative (MOMFI) successfully conducted a three-day medical mission in Coto, Masinloc, Zambales, from 25 to 27 May 2025.

Medical services provided included medical consultation, general and OB/surgery, EENT (Eyes, Ears, Nose, and Throat) assessment, and pharmacy services for proper medication and post-consult care.

The mission was participated in with volunteer physicians, physiatrists, internists, pediatricians, obstetrician-gynecologists, and a general practitioner, alongside post-graduate interns, a US medical student, a caregiver, and medical students from Saint Louis University (SLU) School of Medicine. Through collaborative efforts, the mission reflected the core values of service, compassion, and medical excellence, addressing real community needs with tailored, patient-centered care. The program aligns with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly in Good Health and Well-being (SDG 3), Reduced Inequalities (SDG 10), and Partnerships for the Goals (SDG 17).













SLU Law's CJMM CLAO Balances Courtroom and Community Outreach

The Chief Justice Manuel V. Moran Community Legal Assistance Office (CJMM CLAO) of Saint Louis University School of Law maintained an active schedule throughout March 2025, handling both courtroom duties and community outreach. During the first weeks, Law Student Practitioners (LSPs) gained hands-on courtroom experience under the guidance of a supervising lawyer. They appeared in cases both in court and administrative tribunal. Also, in celebration of Women's Month, CJMM CLAO organized multiple legal education activities focused on laws protecting women's rights. The 14 March 2025 seminar, conducted in partnership with Panpacific University, explored three key legislations: the Safe Spaces Act, Magna Carta for Women, and the Anti-Violence Against Women and Children (VAWC) Act.

The office continued its advocacy on 17 March 2025 with two concurrent seminars. Collaborating with the Prime Movers Society, CJMM CLAO presented the legal frameworks established by the VAWC Act and Safe Spaces Act of 2019. On the same day, a seminar on VAWC and Legal Feminism taught participants how to combat gender-based violence and empowered women and children to assert their rights as agents of change. Expanding its community service efforts, CJMM CLAO partnered with the Paltiing United Seniors Organization (PUSO) on 20 March 2025 to conduct a legal aid mission at Perfecto-Carantes Street, Barangay Malcolm Square. Certified LSPs, supervised by Atty. Jasmine Quiano, provided consultation services to eight clients. Simultaneously, in collaboration with the Humanitarian Legal Assistance Foundation, Inc. (HLAF), the office hosted an online VAWC seminar for BJMP Baguio City Jail Female Dorm participants where LSPs discussed various forms of violence, protection orders, and their legal implications.

The month of March concluded with two seminars on 29 March 2025. During Barangay Camp 7's General Assembly Day, CJMM CLAO discussed Anti-Online Sexual Abuse or Exploitation of Children and Anti-Child Sexual Abuse or Exploitation Materials Act (R.A. 11930). The activity was attended by over 200 participants. In cooperation with the Sangguniang Barangay of Sta. Escolastica Village, the office also conducted an informative discussion on the procedures, rules, and updates of the Katarungang Pambarangay Law.

Through varied initiatives, CJMM CLAO continues to exemplify the ideal integration of legal education, courtroom practice, and community service, thereby fostering SDG 16 (Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions) by ensuring access to justice for all. Furthermore, in spearheading seminars focused on women's rights and conducting outreach efforts aiding senior citizens and incarcerated individuals, CJMM CLAO actively contributed to both SDG 5 (Gender Equality) and SDG 10 (reduced Inequalities). The month's multifaceted activities demonstrated how law students effectively translate theoretical knowledge into practical applications while expanding access to legal assistance.



Gregorio was honored with the prestigious Global Peace Ambassador Award. She was also selected as one of the delegates, representing youth and grassroots activism. In this role, she collaborated with peace builders, human rights lawyers, educators, scientists, and CEOs dedicated to fostering inclusive peace and justice.

The conference echoed a commitment to global development through inner and formal education, trust-based leadership, and inclusive collaboration. Louisian Shines at ASEAN Global Youth Summit 2025

A student from the Bachelor of Science in Social Work program of Saint Louis University's (SLU) School of Teacher Education and Liberal Arts (STELA) proudly represented the Philippines in the recently concluded ASEAN Global Youth Summit 2025. Althea P. Tuvera joined 30 fellow delegates from across Southeast Asia for an enriching program held in Singapore and Malaysia on 24-26 June 2025. The summit blended academic exposure, cultural immersion, and youth advocacy, empowering young leaders to think critically and act sustainably for their communities.

Tuvera's team tackled the pressing issue of plastic waste in coastal villages, linking their solution to SDG 12 (Responsible Consumption and Production) and SDG 14 (Life Below Water). Drawing from her social work studies, Althea applied the ecological systems theory, analyzing the problem through micro, mezzo, and macro perspectives while considering the relationship between people and their environment. The group's winning idea, "Seastain", short for sea sustainability, proposed a community-driven circular economy. Their plan involved a plastic collection and buyback scheme, an eco-product line featuring upcycled souvenirs and household items, hands-on eco-tourism workshops for visitors, and local school partnerships for sustainability education. Among all project groups, theirs was awarded "Best Youth Inspiration Idea Project."

Proving her commitment to her advocacy, Althea also stood out in the "Youth Speak Up" competition. Delivering a heartfelt three-minute speech about youth social impact, she shared her experiences as a volunteer for the Philippines' Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program (4Ps) and as a global volunteer in Indonesia. Her speech emphasized the vital role of young people in building a better society. Out of 30 delegates, only four were chosen for the "Best Inspiration Speak Up" award and Tuvera proudly secured fourth place. This made her the only delegate to receive two gold recognitions during the entire summit.

The summit ended on a meaningful note as Althea and her peers volunteered at a small school in Malaysia, where they taught local children basic reading skills and songs. This heartfelt activity highlighted the delegates' commitment to creating positive change wherever they go. Tuvera's success at the ASEAN Global Youth Summit 2025 serves as an inspiration for Filipino youth everywhere. It is a reminder that dedication, collaboration, and a genuine desire to make a difference can open doors to a brighter, more sustainable future.

Through these initiatives, Louisian youth leaders continue to uphold SLU's vision of forming socially engaged, globally competent citizens dedicated to sustainable development and positive social change, reflecting the university's ongoing commitment to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, particularly SDG 4: Quality Education and SDG 17: Partnerships for the Goals.

The said meeting was held on 19 September 2024 at the Burgos Conference Room, Administrative Building, SLU Main Campus.

Research presented were:

- Removal of Micoplastics in Balili River: Optimizing the Operational Parameters for Electrocoagulations with Performed Anodes Using Taguchi Method (SEA)
- Coconut Coir-Derived Nanocellulose Memberane with Zeolite Support for Adsorption of Lead in Aqueous Solution (SEA)
- Characterization, Geo-spatial Distribution Modelling, and Quantification of Tailings from Small Scale Mines in Benguet: A GIS Study (SAS)
- Assessment and Geo-spatial Distribution Modelling of Priority Heavy Metals in the Abra River Tributary Sediments at Guinaoang, Mankayan (SAS)

Saint Louis University School of Engineering and Architecture (SLU SEA) won the Best Paper Award during the second Physical Internet National Symposium held on 28 November 2024 at the De La Salle University in Manila. This event brought together experts, academics, and industry professionals to discuss the future of the internet and its impact on various sectors in the Philippines.

The Best Paper Award was received by Engr. Maria Corazon Ocampo for her paper titled, "The Potential of Physical Internet and Blockchain in Enhancing Urban Logistics: A Baguio City Perspective." The research was recognized for its significant contribution to improving internet access and connectivity in Baguio City. She also received special commendation for its practical applications and potential impact on improving internet access, optimizing empty spaces of sari-sari stores and private vehicles in the city.

The 2nd Philippine Internet Symposium underscored the critical role of the internet in driving economic growth and social progress which is aligned with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals 4 (Quality Education), 8 (Decent Work and Economic Growth, and 17 (Partnership for the Goals). As the country continues to embrace digital transformation, events like this play a vital role in shaping the future of the internet in the Philippines.

Tarlac State University sought partnership with Saint Louis University for an extension program on the development and production of Aeta Mag-antsi bloom books, which will be utilized by Manabayukan Elementary School. The said program is composed of series of activities that include: 1. orientation and writeshop on the use of the Bloom Software, 2. development of stories written in the local language, 3. sessions on validating the bloom books, and pilot testing of the bloom books. The bloom books are now on the final editing and will be undergo production of final copies to be given to the Department of Education for the students to use.
